VIRGINIA'S BLUE RIDGE MOUNTAINS PROVIDE SCENIC BACKDROP FOR EMMONS FAMILY REUNION

The 2025 *Emmons* Family Reunion, held September 25–28 in Lynchburg, Virginia, is in the books. Some drove by car over 800 miles while others flew in to share together the special bond the shipmates created many years ago and to honor the lost shipmates.

D-Day Memorial Visit

With guests having arrived throughout the day Thursday, the weekend's activities were underway Friday with a visit to the National D-Day Memorial in Bedford, Virginia. Local ROTC students presented the colors as our annual memorial service honored the 60 fallen sailors. A guided tour of the memorial followed.

Next was a short bus ride to enjoy lunch together at Liberty Station, a converted train station dating back to 1852. The group then returned to the hotel for an afternoon program featuring presentation of rubbings of the names of lost shipmates from the Okinawa Peace Park (see story, page 2) and a showing of Kurt REESE's video of April's Memorial Dive. Then it was on to a buffet dinner and time together in the hospitality room.

Saturday's Association business meeting included the re-election of all officers and Board of Directors members.

Despite the rain, everyone took advantage of Saturday's free time to take in attractions the area had to offer, including Appomattox Court House, the National Civil War Museum, Thomas Jefferson's Poplar Forest Retreat and The Bedford Boys Tribute Center, honoring the memory of the 21 boys from Bedford, VA, who died on the first day of the Normandy Invasion.

Banquet Highlights

Saturday's banquet program provided everyone the opportunity to meet this year's scholarship recipient, Walker CRESSWELL, as he shared a reading of his essay. To close out the program, guest speaker Brett ELDRIDGE engaged everyone in attendance as he recounted his experience creating the 3D model of the *Emmons* and his other adventures (see story below).

UNDERWATER EXPLORER SHARES EXPERIENCE DIVING ON THE EMMONS

Our keynote speaker at the reunion banquet, underwater explorer Brett ELDRIDGE, shared his experience of diving on historic wrecks and creating a 3D model of the *Emmons* in her final resting spot.

Brett, who lives in Southern California, talked of his passion for diving and photographing wrecks and the history behind them. He told of his time diving on and

photographing the HMHS Britannic, which operated as a hospital ship during WWI and sunk after hitting a German mine, and his discovery of a WWII F8F Bearcat fighter aircraft off the coast of California.

Brett provided great insight into what's involved in diving on wrecks such as the *Emmons*, including the



RUBBINGS PROVIDE TANGIBLE PIECE OF MEMORIAL

In June, Steph PAWELSKI, who delves deeply into WW2 history in Okinawa, reached out to us regarding the island's Cornerstone of Peace Memorial. The black granite monuments located there contain the etchings of the nearly 250,000 who gave their lives during the Battle of Okinawa.

Included among those names are the 60 *Emmons* shipmates who gave their lives. Realizing most of us are unable to make the trip to Okinawa, Steph offered to provide us with a rubbing of the shipmates' names.

Rubbing art is a technique where a piece of paper is placed over the

(ELDRIDGE....Continued from page 1) need to go through mandatory decompression and the value of rebreathers which recirculate exhaled air, thus allowing for longer dives.

He proceeded to explain his interest in the *Emmons* and his love for destroyers. The *Emmons*, he said, is the only destroyer in diveable depths that served in both the Atlantic and Pacific. As a history buff, that, and the ship's impressive service history, placed the *Emmons* high on his bucket list.

So Brett coordinated with Kurt and made the trip to Okinawa, diving on the *Emmons* for five consecutive days, taking over 7400 photos. He explained to create the 3D model, he used a process called photogrammetry which involved a computer program that ran for 35 hours

engraved name and charcoal, or something similar, is rubbed across the paper to transfer the name. In this case, she provided us a rubbing of all 60 men's names which was on

combining the 7400 photos into a final 3D model. A link allowing you to view the model is available on our website's Media page.

Brett explained one benefit of creating these 3D models is that it better assists in identification of the craft when discovered which often can result in notification of the families. In addition, Naval History and Heritage Command in Washington is also provided with all documentation, data and models for their use in updating their records.

Brett was presented with a copy of *The Emmons Saga* with an inscription from the Association expressing our appreciation for sharing the result of his work with us and increasing awareness of the *Emmons* story with others in his community of explorers.
