

SURPRISE APPEARANCE OF BUILDER'S PLAQUE KICKS OFF FALL RIVER REUNION; RECORD ATTENDANCE

Interesting programs have always been a feature of Emmons Family reunions, but none as surprising and dramatic as the one that greeted attendees and set the tone for their annual gathering in Fall River in September.

When the Emmons group gathered at Battleship Cove for their traditional Friday morning memorial service Rich ANGELINI, assistant curator at the Cove, was introduced for welcoming remarks. His remarks, however, didn't end with his official welcome.

Plaque Makes Appearance

He went on to recount involvement in the journey of the *Emmons'* builder's plaque – stolen from the wreck, then recovered and returned to the Navy. As he did, reunion hosts Al and Donna CAPPEL-LI stepped up and removed a coverlet from the plaque itself, on loan for our reunion from the Navy's History and Heritage Command in Washington, DC (see photo on outside panel).

The assembled Emmons group briefly showed wonderment, then broke into applause as they realized this was our very own Emmons builder's plaque.

The memorial service then continued, after which attendees visited the **USS Massachusetts** and the destroyer **Joseph P. Kennedy Jr** and, of course, the Ship's Store before reassembling for lunch in the PT Boat building.

Exciting Effect Continues

Excitement of the plaque's appearance carried over into the rest of the weekend's activities, beginning with the gettogether for an Okinawa update Friday afternoon and the informal buffet dinner that evening.

Saturday morning's Association meeting acted on a number of important issues and heard reports on ongoing programs, including the Library of Congress Project and outreach initiatives of the very active Legacy Committee.

Four Generations at Banquet

The enjoyable three days of activity culminated Saturday evening with a record attendance at the annual banquet. The 100 persons attending included four generations of the Emmons family. Highlight of the evening's program was recognition of this year's Emmons/Griffin Scholarship award recipients, Sara HOFFMAN and Eileen KORNEY.

PLAQUE'S LOAN NEARLY ABORTED BY DC SHOOTING

The surprise appearance of the Emmons builder's plaque that brought such elation to Reunion attendees almost didn't happen, an improbable consequence of the Washington Navy Yard shooting in September.

During their early planning, Al and Donna CAPPELLI envisioned acquiring the plaque for surprise display at the Reunion and reached out to Emmons friend Rich ANGELINI for possible assist. In addition to his volun-

teer work at Battleship Cove, Rich is a regular employee of the Navy Department.

Working through associates at the History and Heritage Command in Washington, Rich was able to give the required assurances of security, handling and return, and received clearance for loan of the plaque. It was to be shipped in time for our reunion in late September.

Then came the universally reported shooting at the Navy Yard on September 16 and everything was put on hold, with no timetable for being lifted. It appeared the plaque's appearance would not happen.

But Rich stayed in touch and on Wednesday, two days before our scheduled visit to the Cove, he got word the plaque could be released. But only overnight delivery could make it happen in time.

Rich consulted with Al and Donna, arrangements were made, and the plaque arrived at 4:30 Thursday afternoon, the day before our visit.

IN MEMORIAM

We learned during the Reunion of the passing of former shipmate John J. GILLIGAN on August 26 at his home in Cincinnati, OH.

Lt. Gilligan had served as assistant gunnery officer on the *Emmons* and transferred to the *Rodman* as gunnery officer at the time of our deployment to the Pacific. He was awarded the Silver Star for his action during the attack on both ships at Okinawa.

John GILLIGAN served the people of his state of Ohio in many capacities during a long and illustrious professional and political career and was governor from 1971 to 1975.

The eyes of banquet attendees were treated to a unique wall hanging that formed a backdrop for the speakers' rostrum -- a colorful, full-size, handmade quilt, crafted in the form of our Flag with the *Emmons* in the center. Commissioning of the quilt was made possible by our reunion hosts, Donna and Al CAPPELLI.

Kurt REESE again provided a video of the 2013 memorial dive held at the Emmons for viewing at the reunion, which can also be seen on our website; however, this year, he surprised everyone with his story of salvaging a darken-ship lamp from the decimated No. 3 gun mount.

During an October dive, he discovered a recent typhoon had unearthed the lamp, which was now in plain view to less-scrupulous divers who wouldn't hesitate to take home a trophy. Preferring that it be in the hands of the Em-

mons Family, he rescued it from the sea bottom.

He worked tirelessly restoring the metal cage to remove any sign of the 68 years it spent on the ocean floor, then sent it halfway around the world to have a new red glass lens custom made, then back to Okinawa, where he finished the assembly and forwarded it on to the Emmons Association.

The result was the "unveiling" of the light fixture on Friday, and the viewing of a video documenting the restoration process. The light made its rounds among crew members, who exhibited their appreciation for the effort that made it possible.
