

The Lt. John J. Griffin, Jr. /USS EMMONS Memorial Scholarship

For the 2025 – 2026 Academic Year

"By her own aggressiveness and the courage and skill of her officers and men, the USS EMMONS achieved a record of gallantry in combat reflecting the highest credit upon herself and the United States Naval Service." - Excerpt from the Navy Unit Commendation awarded the USS EMMONS.

Purpose: To provide supplemental educational opportunities beyond high school to students who are descendants of those who served aboard the USS EMMONS at any time from the date of her commissioning (December 5, 1941) to her final day of glory (April 6, 1945) so as to preserve, maintain and promote the legacy of the 60 courageous men who made the ultimate sacrifice in the defense of their ship and their shipmates against overwhelming numerically superior enemy forces on April 6, 1945 during the Battle of Okinawa. Their fighting spirit and that of the surviving EMMONS crewmembers led by Lt John J. Griffin, Jr. was in keeping with the finest traditions of the United States Navy and must be preserved for the benefit of future generations of Americans.

Eligibility: Applications may be submitted by any high school senior or graduate of secondary school who will be a full-time student at an institution of accredited higher education, including 2- and 4-year college, community college, post-secondary vocational/technical school (all defined herein as undergraduate school) and graduate school, and is 1) a direct lineal descendant of one who served aboard the USS EMMONS, or 2) a direct, lineal descendant of a sibling of any childless crew member who lost his life as a result of the April 6, 1945, attack at Okinawa. Full-time status is defined as at least 12 credits (undergraduate) or 9 credits (graduate) per semester unless otherwise defined as full-time by the school's Office of the Registrar.

Amount of Awards: Two one-year, \$2500 awards, one of which must go to a qualified undergraduate student. If there are no qualified undergraduate applicants, both scholarships will be awarded to the two highest qualifying applicants. In addition, as many as two \$500 honorable mention awards may be granted as outlined on page 4. Disbursement of funds will be contingent upon verification of full-time enrollment as defined above at the accredited institution of higher education. In the event no applicants meet the criteria or provide the necessary documentation required herein, no scholarship will be awarded.

Availability: Applications are due May 31. All applicants will be notified by July 31 of the Legacy Committee's decision.

Procedure: Complete and submit the enclosed scholarship application and associated essay with supporting documentation noted below, either electronically no later than May 31, 2025, to ussemmons@gmail.com or by mail postmarked no later than May 31, 2025, to the address below. Please note specific submission requirements in #5 below regarding letters of reference.

Supporting Documentation: Please include the following documentation with your application:

1. A certified copy of your most recent academic transcript. (High School, College, Graduate School, etc. as applicable) Home-schooled students are to provide a transcript signed and dated by a parent or guardian.
2. Evidence in the form of an enrollment verification letter or form provided by the Office of the Registrar of your full-time enrollment in, or acceptance by, the accredited educational institution to which the scholarship will be applied. If submitting only acceptance documentation with your application because you have not yet enrolled for the upcoming academic year and you are later selected as a recipient of a scholarship, you will be asked to provide evidence of your actual full-time enrollment before any funds are disbursed.
3. Copy of your birth certificate that, used in conjunction with the family tree in #4 below, verifies your relationship to an EMMONS crewmember. (not required for previous applicants).
4. A family tree diagram tracing your direct family ancestral lineage as related to the EMMONS crewmember or the sibling of a childless crewmember who lost his life at Okinawa. This will be used to verify your relationship to a crewmember. (not required for previous applicants).
5. Two letters of reference, one of which must be from a current or former teacher, either 1) mailed directly by the provider to the USPS address in this application, 2) emailed to ussemmons@gmail.com directly by the provider, or 3) forwarded via mail by the applicant in the provider's sealed envelope to the USPS address in this application (letters must be dated during 2024 or 2025).
6. A double-spaced essay of 500 to 750 words that addresses the essay prompt on page 3 of this application. **Please note, the written essay is to be limited to two pages and essay attachments and exhibits may be submitted but will not be considered in essay judging.**
7. **Please note, to minimize concerns of plagiarism and lack of original thought, the use of artificial intelligence technology in preparing the essay is prohibited.**
8. All documentation must be postmarked by May 31, 2025.

ORIGINAL ESSAY: (500-750 words)

Please Limit Essay to Two Pages and Include Essay with Application

Essay Prompt:

April 1, 2025 marks the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Okinawa, which saw the death and destruction of over a quarter of a million people including 110,000 Japanese combatants, 12,000 Americans combat personnel and between 100,000 – 150,000 Okinawan civilians. This was the bloodiest battle Americans fought throughout the course of WWII. The United States Navy sustained 368 ships damaged, 36 ships sunk, 4,907 sailors killed and 4,824 wounded. Among those American casualties were 60 sailors killed in action aboard USS EMMONS (DD-457/DMS-22) on April 6, 1945 when it was struck by five Japanese kamikaze aircraft while on radar picket patrol in support of the invasion.

The Japanese battle plan for Okinawa called for the maximum attrition of enemy forces so as to break the morale of American forces and the resolve of America's citizenry to see the war to its just end. Lieutenant General Ushijima Mitsuru called upon his men to fight to the death and kill as many Americans as possible in accordance to the Bushido Code of Conduct. Despite the carnage inflicted upon the EMMONS by the kamikaze attack, the crew rallying under the leadership of Lieutenant John Griffin tended to their wounded and conducted an orderly evacuation from the stricken warship.

#1. How do you think these men were able to maintain order and discipline within their ranks in the face of such a dire crisis?

In the years that have transpired since the Battle of Okinawa, the resolve of the American public has been tested in numerous conflicts including Korea, Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan. In some of these conflicts, America rose to meet the challenge and stayed the course leading to victory whereas in other instances the American public grew weary of conflict and withdrew in defeat.

#2. In today's culture, do you believe America's citizenry still possesses the same heartfelt sense of duty, patriotism and resolve displayed by "America's Greatest Generation" aboard the EMMONS during the Battle of Okinawa and throughout the course of WWII? Explain why or why not.

#3. Finally, what can you personally do in an effort to ensure that American resolve, as was displayed during WWII and aboard the USS EMMONS, will never be extinguished and will endure with the passage of time.

Essay Judging Criteria

Evaluation of essays will be performed by the USS EMMONS Legacy Committee led by the treasurer of the USS EMMONS Association. It shall be the responsibility of the EMMONS Association treasurer to screen all documents submitted by applicants and verify their eligibility. The treasurer in turn shall screen all essays to the extent that the identity of each essay's author remains anonymous, and subsequently forward the essays to the other members for unbiased evaluation and ranking.

In the event a relative of a Legacy Committee member submits an application, the treasurer will remove that member of the committee from participation in the scholarship selection process and replace that member with a qualified USS EMMONS Association member. Also, committee members are prohibited from providing guidance or any other assistance with regard to the essay, other than that already contained herein. The Legacy Committee will judge essays using the rubric on the following page, while considering:

- Originality. Treatment of the theme should show imagination and human interest, and
- Content. Clearly express your ideas in an organized manner; fully develop your theme and use transitions to move from one idea to another.

In addition to the two \$2500 awards, a \$500 honorable mention award may be granted if at least 5 qualifying applications are received. A second \$500 honorable mention award may be granted if at least 7 qualifying applications are received. Honorable mention recipients must score at least an average of 3 on the judging criteria, excluding Mechanics, in the scoring rubric on the following page.

SCORING RUBRIC

A rubric used by the judges in evaluating the essays is provided below. Each criterion is judged based on a point value of 4 (best) to 0 (worst), except for Mechanics, which has a point value of 2 (best) to 0 (worst). The essay prompt is provided on page 3.

CRITERION I: DISCUSS HOW THE MEN OF THE EMMONS WERE ABLE TO MAINTAIN ORDER AND DISCIPLINE IN THE FACE OF THE KAMIKAZE ATTACK.

- 4: Excellent discussion of how the men were able to maintain order and discipline.
- 3: Very good discussion of how the men were able to maintain order and discipline.
- 2: Adequate discussion of how the men were able to maintain order and discipline.
- 1: Poor discussion of how the men were able to maintain order and discipline.
- 0: Criterion not addressed

CRITERION II: EXPLAIN WHY IT IS OR IS NOT YOUR BELIEF THAT AMERICA'S CITIZENRY STILL POSSESSES THE SAME HEARTFELT SENSE OF DUTY, PATRIOTISM AND RESOLVE DISPLAYED ABOARD THE EMMONS DURING THE BATTLE OF OKINAWA AND THROUGHOUT WWII.
